Class Information

Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs have shown that we are really good learners for all adults this week. It has been good to see the children responding to Miss Cain, our student teacher, whilst she has been teaching some of the lessons this week. We have been writing our postcards from Little Red Riding Hood and trying hard to remember to put some description and sequence our writing using time adverbials such as 'next', 'after that' or 'finally'. Some of us worked hard to make our writing really interesting, especially with squirrels swooping in the dark woods! In Maths, Reception have been learning how to show groups of 4 or 5 in different ways and Year 1 have started learning how to find differences by counting back and comparing number sentences. In DT, we have started to make our milk bottle elephant, carefully cutting out the correct shape from the bottle.

Reading congratulations to: Isla for achieving at least 10 reads at home and recording them in her Home Reading Record. Congratulations also to Ethan and Jaxson for achieving their 25 reads at home and Charlotte and Isaac for achieving 50 reads at home. Remember to keep recording your reading in your record every day.

Our Shining Light this week is awarded to Noah, for being so kind and supportive with his feedback to others. Well done, Noah, you really think carefully about how your words make others feel.

Squirrels

In Squirrels this week, we have been focusing on the construction of a sentence to help us recognise when to use a full stop and capital letter. The children have done amazingly well at recognising the subject and the verb - have they sung you the song yet? In Maths, Year 2 and 3 have been looking at methods of addition and subtraction. Year 2 have been adding three 1-digit numbers, and Year 3 have been adding 1-digit and 2-digit numbers to numbers in the hundreds. In Science we began to explore everyday materials and what their properties are; beginning to think about how their properties make them suitable for use in everyday items. What objects and different materials can be discovered at home?

Shining Light: Bow for increased confidence in maths; independently using her equipment to add and subtract and even demonstrating her learning to others.

Foxes

Foxes class have been busy writing their suspense stories making sure to include lots of great descriptive phrases to set an eerie atmosphere. Their final write up next week will be displayed to showcase their fantastic start to their Year 4 writing journey and all the progress they have made so far this year. We will then move on to our new unit: information texts. In Maths, Miss Joisce has been so proud of how resilient the class have been while learning to add two 4-digit numbers using column addition with exchanges. The whole class have made great strides and we are moving on to formal and efficient methods of subtraction next week.

Congratulations to: Nicole for achieving 25 reads at home. We also have 5 children nearly at 50 reads, which is great.

Our Shining Light this week is Harvey for showing fantastic independent learning in his writing this week.

Otters

I am really proud to report that Otters have yet again proven what a fantastic class they are this week. They have been taught by two different supply teachers whilst Miss Maskell was attending training, both of whom stated how lovely the class were. The Year 5's had great fun on Tuesday attending the dodgeball festival at TNHA. We have explored food chains in Science, square and cube numbers in Maths and have also started writing our suspense stories in English. We have also explored remembrance ahead of our memorial service, considering what life was like for soldiers during World War 1, what service means, and why poppies have been chosen to be a symbol for remembrance.

Message from the Executive Headteacher:

Attendance;

I am very pleased that attendance across our schools is going up. Thank you for making sure your children are in school every day that they are not ill; every day makes a real difference and good attendance is an aid to super learning that only Parents/Carers can give their child. When there are attendance concerns, we believe that working together in partnership is the best way to resolve these and achieve success for your children.

Whilst our attendance is going up, it isn't as high as we want it to be. The diagram below really clearly shows that even when children have attendance of 95%, which sounds high, they really do miss out.

98-100%

Excellent - Children are accessing all learning opportunities

96-97%

Good - Very few learning opportunities are missed

94-95%

- · Risk of underachievement
- Up to 10 school days absent in an academic year

92-93%

- · High risk of underachievement
- Up to 15 school days absent in an academic year

90-92%

- · Severe risk of underachievement
- Upwards of 22 school days absent in the academic year

< 90%

- · Extreme risk of underachievement
- Upwards of 22 school days absent in the academic year

I looked at an example of one of our children in the Federation. The child has no additional needs, no particular illnesses, no operations, no difficulties in school. They do put a lot of pressure on their family to allow them to stay off school. Already by half-term, the child has missed 7 sessions (the equivalent of 3 ½ days) and their attendance is only 91.57%, very close to the level at which we involve the Local Authority (90% - defined as Persistent Absenteeism). Now 3 ½ days does not sound like a great deal of absence, or that it could matter, but I looked at what the child has missed out on:

1st session missed - missed the chance to be in a pupil and staff meeting that would have allowed the child to make a presentation to a group and boosted their self esteem.

2nd session missed- Missed out on a trombone lesson and didn't get to go to Games Club or Multi Sports Club.

3rd session missed- Didn't get to go to the Tag Rugby competition and missed their weekly one to one tutoring session.

4th -7th sessions missed - Missed swimming, another Trombone lesson, Cross Country festival at TNHA, and didn't get to go to Games Club or Multi-Sports Club.

That child has also already missed 3 Maths lessons, 3 Writing lessons, 3 reading lessons, 2 music lessons, two PE lessons, one history lesson, one science lesson and one Spanish lesson. That is around 15 hours of learning.

They have also missed out on the chance to play instruments, develop their language skills and sport skills, take part in competitions, challenge themselves, know what it is like to push yourself and then achieve something. They didn't get to stand up in Collective Worship and be applauded for representing our Federation so well. They didn't get to enjoy themselves with their peers and cement their social relationships.

And what about whether this child is on track to achieve the expected standard for their age?

They are not, and indeed if they continued down this path, they would actually drop a whole grade at GCSE. That could be from a pass grade to a fail, and could stop them being able to take the options at A Level or BTEC or similar that they want to and could indeed limit their whole life chances.

All this, just from a few days off here and there over time.

Our role is to support you to ensure that all our children are in school all the days that they are able to be there, because we want those opportunities for each and every one of our children.

So if you know that your child's attendance is lower than you'd like, please come and talk to us and together we'll work to improve.

Private Fostering;

Please see the below from Norfolk County Council:

Is someone you know looking after a child or looking after your child?

Where children or young people are currently being looked after by someone else, it's called private fostering and there is a legal requirement that the council must be informed so we can offer support and advice and ensure the child's needs are being safely met. If a child or young person under the age of 16, or 18 if they are disabled, is being looked after by someone other than their parents or a close relative for 28 days or more, then this should be reported it to the Children's Advice and Duty Service (CADS) at Norfolk County Council on osa448008020 between 8am and 8pm Monday to Friday. A private foster carer could be a family friend, a neighbour, or an extended family member like a cousin, great grandparent or great aunt/uncle.
