Message from the Executive Headteacher:

Keeping children safe online:

This can be such a daunting task and one that worries all parents I talk to about it and me too.

Top tips from the NSPCC include:

Listen to what they have to say and show an interest. They could give you a demo of their favourite app or show you their favourite YouTube or TikTok account.

They will probably be able to teach you things you don't know! This will also give you an opportunity to chat about any safety settings they might already have in place.

Regular conversations with your child will encourage them to come to you if they ever need support or advice.

If your child asks you a question you don't know the answer to, or speaks to you about a negative experience they had online, here are some of things you could do:

Pupil Voice from the Autumn;

As you know, each half-term we talk to our children about their time in school and ask their opinions. Last term we asked about learning, about how much they enjoy reading, about bullying and mean moments and about whether the children felt safe in school.

We had super responses, which really gave us a good knowledge of our children's views and feelings.

When asked about learning and reading,

our children discussed the subjects they were enjoying in school, such as the Egyptians, art and Maths. Almost every child enjoys reading, and older children were able to talk about authors and types of books that they enjoy, such as 'funny books' and David Walliams, Danny Champion of the World, Artemis Fowl and Harry Potter, with some preferring non-fiction and fact books.

One lovely comment about the teacher reading to them was that it 'made the world sound happier'. Children said that reading makes you brainier, gives you ideas and helps you with your learning.

When asked about discrimination, most children said that there was not, with a few talking more about mean moments, which we will follow up. Most children felt that there was no bullying, with a few feeling that there had been on occasions, but teachers made this stop. We will follow this up.

100% of children felt safe in school. 100% of children felt that there was an adult to help and who would help, even when there had been a 'mean moment'.

Overall, this was a very positive and pleasing survey. There were one or two individual things to follow up, such as checking that all children understand the difference between bullying (ongoing and deliberate) and mean moments (occasional falling out).

This term, we will be talking about online safety as we approach Safer Internet Day in February.
