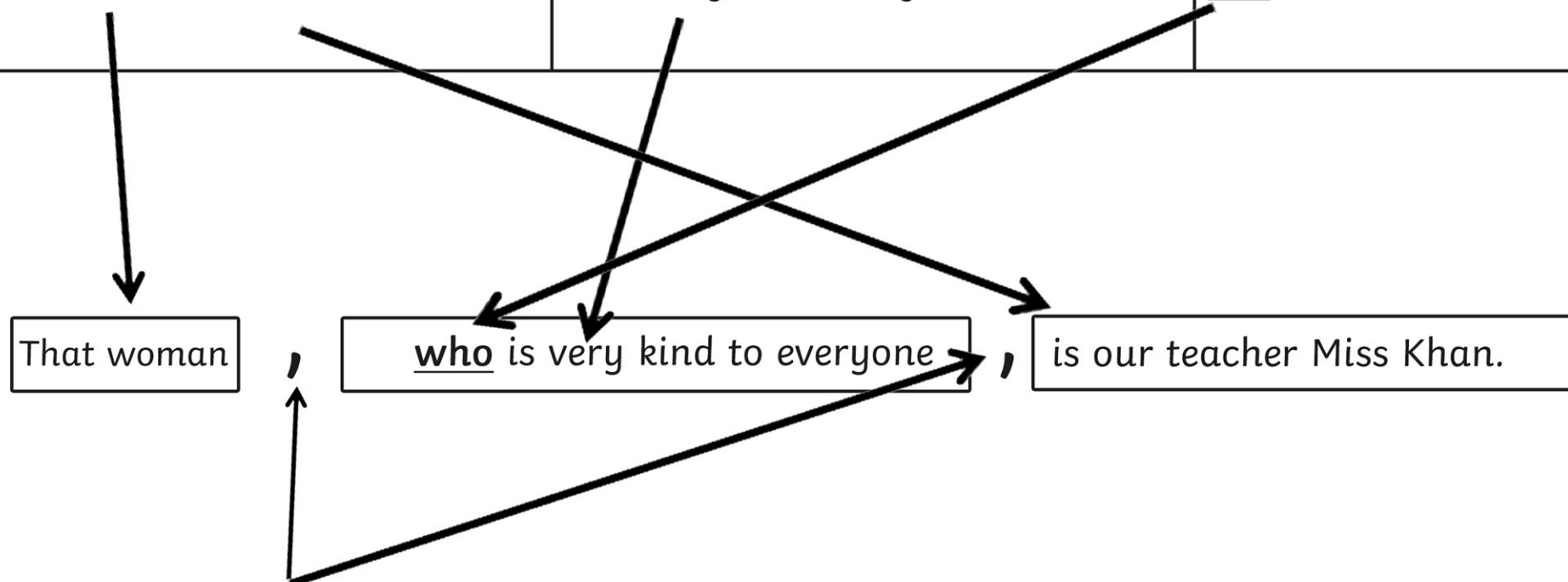


Relative Pronouns and Embedded Clause

Do you want to add some interesting information to your sentences? Try putting an extra information clause in the middle to make a complex sentence. You will need to replace the **subject** with a relative pronoun.

Look at this example, which shows you how to do it:

First simple sentence (Main clause)	Extra information simple sentence (Subordinate clause)	Relative pronoun
That woman is our teacher Miss Khan.	<i>She</i> is very kind to everyone.	<u>who</u>



Don't forget your commas!

Cut up the row of the table. Rearrange the sentences so the relative pronoun and extra information are in the middle. Stick them onto a larger sheet to make a complex sentence.

First simple sentence (Main clause)	Extra information simple sentence (Subordinate clause)	Relative pronoun
That woman is our teacher Miss Khan.	<i>She</i> is very kind to everyone.	<u>who</u>
James is good at hide-and-seek.	<i>James</i> is the finder.	<u>who</u>
My cat purrs when I feed her.	<i>She</i> loves prawns.	<u>who</u>
Our head teacher is called Mrs. Adams.	<i>She</i> has an office near the main entrance.	<u>who</u>
Asha and Zainab don't eat pork.	<i>They</i> are Muslims.	<u>who</u>
Dad couldn't get into the house.	<i>He</i> had lost his keys.	<u>who</u>
Justin drank a whole litre of water.	<i>He</i> was very thirsty.	<u>who</u>
The summer holidays are great.	<i>They</i> last six weeks.	<u>which</u>
Carrots can be orange, yellow or purple.	<i>Carrots</i> are full of vitamins.	<u>which</u>
